Owner-ing it: Rehoming greyhounds

Under GWIC's Greyhound Rehoming Policy and the NSW Greyhound Welfare Code of Practice, it is greyhound owners who are responsible for rehoming any greyhounds they do not wish to retain.

There are several appropriate avenues available to owners when it

comes to rehoming.



Rehoming privately as a pet to a person who is not a registered participant.



Through the Greyhounds As Pets (GAP) program.



Acceptance into another rehoming program.

Prohibited substances advice +

A reminder that Non-Steriodal Anti-Inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) are prohibited substances and can only be used to treat a greyhound when prescribed by a registered vet. Then take these 3 steps:



CHECK: Know the withholding period.



WAIT: NSAIDs must be eliminated from a greyhound's system by race day.




SEEK: If you or your vet have questions, contact GWIC.
